Countable nouns	Uncountable nouns	use	Examples
many	much	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li data-bbox="765 219 1205 380">• mostly in questions and negations <li data-bbox="765 492 1205 710">• in affirmative sentences with too, so, how and as <li data-bbox="765 831 1205 994">• at the beginning of the sentence (in formal English) 	<p data-bbox="1244 219 1731 323"><i>Are there many homeless people in Athens?</i></p> <p data-bbox="1244 492 1765 596"><i>There is too much sugar in my coffee.</i></p> <p data-bbox="1244 863 1727 967"><i>Much money is spent on space exploration.</i></p>

Countable nouns	Uncountable nouns	use	Examples
A few	A little	they show a small amount (positive meaning) and can be used with only .	<i>She has lived in England for a few years.</i> <i>I've only got a little work to do.</i>

Countable nouns	Uncountable nouns	use	Examples
few	little	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> they show a very small amount (negative meaning) and can go with very, so, too, as and how. 	<p><i>There are very few pencils on the table (not enough for everyone).</i></p> <p><i>There's too little sugar in my coffee.</i></p>

Countable and uncountable nouns	use	Examples
<p>a lot (of)</p> <p>lots (of)</p> <p>plenty (of)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • in affirmative sentences before nouns and pronouns <p>A lot, Lots and Plenty can also be used without nouns.</p>	<p><i>A lot of cars run on unleaded fuel.</i></p> <p><i>We needn't buy any more bread; we've got plenty.</i></p>
